## 27th ANNUAL EAS CONFERENCE COOK COLLEGE CAMPUS, NEW BRUNSWICK, N.J.

The 27th Annual EAS Conference August 5-8, 1981 presented a honey of an opportunity for beekeepers (587 from Florida, California, 22 states and 2 provinces of Canada to meet on the Cook College Campus of Rutgers University, at New Brunswick, N.J. to hear bee experts from across the nation to speak on everything from the use of bees by the film industry to how a bee knows its own mother.

A 3-day beekeeping short course preceded the Conference under the supervision of Dr. Dewey Caron, University of Delaware, assisted by Dr. Robert Berthold, Delaware Valley College, PA, Dr. Clarence Collison, Pennsylvania State University, Dr. Lawrence Connor, Beekeeping Education Service, Connecticut, and Jacob Mathenius, Jr., New Jersey State Apiarist. Many of the 92 attending the short course expressed that it was one of the best they had ever attended.

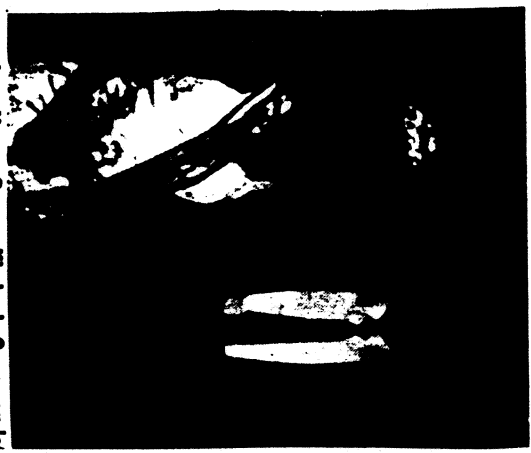
On Wednesday, August 5, 53 persons gathered at the Food Science Building to take part in the Master Beekeeper's Certification Program testing initiated at this Conference. This program is to certify qualified beekeepers, to provide assistance, and help to educate beginners, or to serve in other capacities in the community as expert beekeepers.

Testing was under the supervision of Dr. Clarence Collison, Dr. Dewey Caron, Dr. Charles Mason, Dr. Roger Morse, Paul Corner and Pete Bizzoso.

Preceding Wednesday evening's dinner, Mike Valosin hosted an "on-the-house" Happy Hour sponsored by the N.J. Beekeepers Association. Mike and his bartender were kept busy and this free cocktail party went over in a big way.

Following dinner, the Professional Apiculturalist Society met upstairs in the Student Union Center and it was followed by the 27th Annual EAS Delegates meeting.

On Thursday morning, August 6, EAS President, Dr. Raddlyne Roberts, called the session to order. A

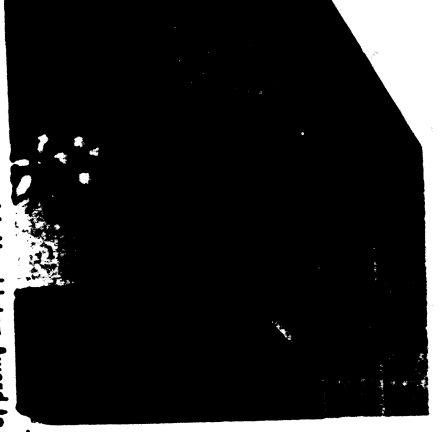

Pennsylvania showed how to "Prepare Ukrainian Easter Eggs", and Dr. Bob Barthold demonstrated "Poured Candles." South Jersey Bee Inspector, Walt Wilson, brought his portable, mobile honey house to the Hickman Hall parking lot and demonstrated how to extract honey at their outdoors. Jack Mathenius presented a workshop on "Bee Diseases" at Hickman Hall also.

Thursday afternoon was the big day for the press to cover the EAS Conference. CBS Radio of New York City sent a crew down; they were followed by NBC TV, Channel 4 of New York who sent reporter Cliff Morrison who bravely donned a bee beard with the assistance of Bob Harvey and Don Hopkins. It took 9 takes before Cliff gave a toast with Mead to be shown on NEWSCENTER 4 news, Channel 9, WOR, New York, also sent their crew who covered the entire ground floor activities in Hickman Hall. Last, but not least, the N.J. TV station, Channel 52, NJPTV crew took quite a bit of footage for a documentary.

The greatest attraction at Hickman Hall was Bob Harvey's "Wall Display" in Room 129 which was like a magnet attracting the most visitors and the press. The traffic was extremely heavy there and Bob and Dottie Harvey did a superb job cramming all of the display in that "tiny" room. Their 8 foot high observation hive was located on the ground floor of the Student Union Center. A unique feature was a screened-in fly space above the combs.

After activities ceased for the day at Hickman Hall, buses transported everyone to the grounds of the "Log Cabin" where a lavish barbecue was prepared by Luke of the Blue Bird Caterers and

awaited the arrival of the conferees. The food was proportioned out in three sections, with the lines for the delicious lobsters being the longest.

In the meantime, Jack Mathenius of New Jersey, Donald Kolpac of Maryland, and Dale Morse of New York entered a bee beard contest. A 3-pound package of bees was applied to each of the contestants. Unofficially, Dale Morse of New York appeared to have had the more fully developed beard. When the adorning bees were removed from the three participants, Jim Johnson of West Virginia used all of the bees and formed one huge bee beard.

Entertainment at the barbecue was provided by a 4 piece Omagh Band who entertained with a variety of music suitable for all ages, until dark when the buses arrived to pick up the contented party goers for the trip back to their dorms. Upstairs in the Student Union, the EAS Board of Directors met for their annual meeting.

Friday morning's session was called to order by EAS Vice President, Mike Valosin. Dr. James Tew of the Agricultural Institute in Wooster, Ohio spoke of "Beekeeping Around the World." Dr. Raddlyffe Roberts followed him with a talk about "Flowers, Bees and Evolution." Dr. Roger Hooplinamer of the University of Michigan gave a lecture about "Communication in Honey Bees - Truth in Sending."

The 27th Annual EAS Business Meeting was conducted by Jacob Mathenius, Jr. at the request of President Rad Roberts. A moment of silence was offered in memory of Philemon Hewitt.

**Jack Matthenius reported that the 1981 EAS Honey Show supervised by J.D. There were 112 entries in the Honey Show portion, 12 in the Mead, 60 in the Honey Cookery, 21 in the Crafts, 18 in the Gadgets, and 23 in Beeswax. There were 29 classes, 97 ribbons awarded with 78 persons entering the contest of 248 entries. Judges were: Honey Cookery and Gadgets, Bess and Bill Clarke, Honey and Beeswax, Dr. Roger Morse, Crafts Show, Yvonne Root and Mead Show, Dr. Dewey Caron. 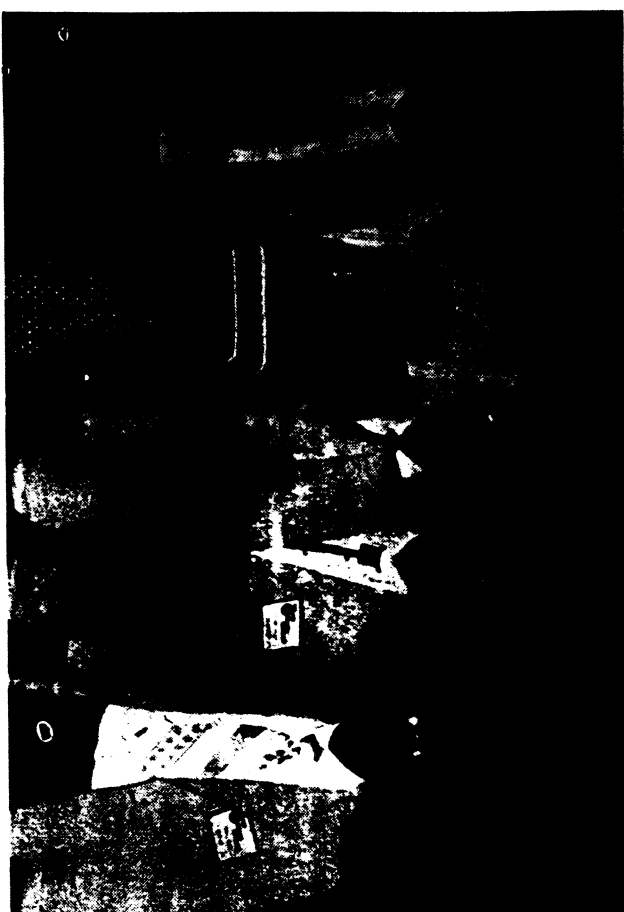
one, the Jersey Shore Dinner was outstanding, the

## 1981 EAS HONEY SHOW

The 1981 New Jersey EAS Honey Show was under the supervision of J.D. Ditson and his committee. It was a very successful show with 78 persons from 12 states, the District of Columbia and the province of Ontario, Canada, who prepared a total of 246 entries. This year there were 2 persons who had only one entry in the entire show, but each won a Silver Tray Award. Another, had only 2 entries, received a Silver Tray Award and the Best in Show Award. Dr. Richard Taylor, with one entry was given the Golden Bee by Tom Ross.

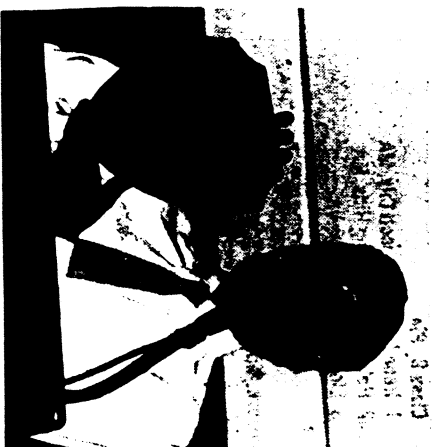
