Beekkeepers, friends and members of EAS are invited to attend the 29th Annual EAS Conference August 10-13, 1983 at the University of Maine at Orono. Known as the "Pine Tree and Vacationland State", Maine offers one of the country's most thrilling vacation experiences.

Beekkeeping Short Course — a 3-day short course will be held in conjunction with the EAS Conference August 8-10th. It is designed for beginners and advanced beekkeepers. The teaching staff is Dr. Larry Connor (coordinator); Dr. Clarence Collin; Mr. Karl Showler; Dr. Radclyffe Roberts; and J.C. Matthaeus, Jr. Pre-registration by the DEADLINE OF JULY 22 is recommended. After that date, there is a penalty fee of \$10 per person added. The pre-registration fee is \$45 per person. In the event pre-registration is very low, the program is subject to reduction or cancellation. For this reason, please enroll by the JULY 22nd DEADLINE.

Master Beekkeepers Certification Program — Testing for new applicants (and those wishing retakes) for the 3-phase testing will be on WED., AUG. 10 at 1:00 p.m. in Nutting Hall at the Univ. of Maine at Orono. All applicants should have been preregistered by the MAY 10, 1983 DEADLINE.

only be open to midnight after that. We would prefer the majority of conferees to register on Wednesday, Aug. 10th from 12 noon to 9:00 p.m., if possible, to avoid congestion in the area.

Costs — Full Conference (3-days) is \$36 per person over the age of 12. Children 6-12 pay \$12. There is no fee for children under the age of 6. One-day conference fees are \$15 per day, per person. CONFERENCE REGISTRATION WILL BE LIMITED TO 600 PERSONS on a first come, first serve basis. Persons registering after the JULY 22 DEADLINE, will pay a penalty fee of \$10 per person. TOTAL PACKAGE COSTS: One Person, no Ladies Luncheon \$110.20, with L.L., \$114.55; Double room, two persons, no Ladies Luncheon, \$211.40, with L.L., \$215.75.

Lodging — Will be in Hart Hall & Hancock Hall dormitories which are not air-conditioned. You may want to bring a fan for your room. Lodging for one person is \$10.50 per day, total for 3 night's lodging, \$31.50. Double room lodging for two persons is \$9 per person, per night, total for 3 night's lodging, \$54.00. There is a LIMIT of 3 persons per room. Children under 14 with parents pay \$5 each, for each day. Parents and older children may split up the occupancy.

Parking — Will be next to the fieldhouse and football field. Only fully, self-contained campers will be permitted to park overnight in this parking area. Others will go to Campgrounds.

Meals — The package cost for all 9 meals (including Wed. Night's dinner - Sat. lunch) is \$42.70 per person, over the age of 10 years. The cost including the Ladies Luncheon is \$47.05 over the age of 10 years. Individual meal costs are: Breakfast \$2.25; Lunch \$2.65; Ladies Luncheon \$7; Wed. Night's dinner \$5; Lobster/Clambake \$13; and Banquet \$10 per person, per meal. Reduced prices for some of the children's meals are: Children 10 and under: Breakfast \$1.60 per child; Lunch \$1.70 per child; Wed. night's dinner \$2.10 per child. Other meals are the same as adults. Meals will be served in WELLS COMMONS dining room (including Lobster/Clambake and Banquet). Weather permitting, the Lobster/Clambake may be held outdoors. No dinner meals will be served on Thurs. and Fri. in lieu of the Lobster/Clambake and Banquet.

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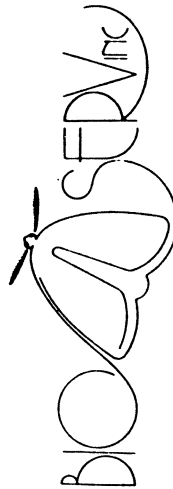

1. All entrants, whether or not they attend the Conference MUST BE registered with and have paid the registration fee to the Eastern Apicultural Society.
2. Only one entry in each class may be made by an individual family.
3. Identifying labels on entries are forbidden.
4. Entries can be registered 1:00-5:00 p.m. on Wednesday, August 10th and Thursday morning, August 11th from 8:30 to 10:30 a.m.
5. No Commercial products or displays.
6. No same entry can be submitted again for three years.
7. The decision of the Judges in all cases will be final.
8. All entries must have been produced by the exhibitor.
9. Prize ribbons will be awarded to the top winners in each class.
10. A sweepstakes award will be made on the basis of the cumulative score obtained by individuals participating in the show. The highest total number of score points accumulated by one individual will obtain the sweepstake prize.
11. The best of show Award will be made to the most outstanding entry determined by a committee of judges considering all first place winners as a group.
12. The Chairman of all shows has the authority to accept, reject and classify all entries.

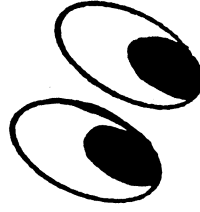
If you are interested in setting up a Commercial Exhibit, you will need to prepay the fee by the July 1983 DEADLINE.

LABELS: Bottles containing wine for competition should not have stick on labels. A tag tied around the neck indicating the class, exhibitor's name or number and a description of the wine is appropriate. Standard labels will be provided and put on at time of entry.

PRESENTATION: Wine bottles should be so filled that when the cork is pushed right home, the air space is between 1/4" and 3/4" in depth. Sparkling wines should have an air space of 1 inch to 1 1/4 inches.

AWARDS: Exhibitors may not make more than one entry per class and no single bottle may be shown in more than one class. Entries from persons of the same surname and address, should NOT be considered separate entries.

OBJECTIONS: Any exhibitor wishing to protest, must do so to the show chairman within one hour of the public opening of the show. Your judge will gladly hold a "judges at the bar" session, and answer exhibitor questions after the show has been opened to the public, if requested.

GENERAL RULES: All wines should have been made by the exhibitor by the process of fermentation.

BOTTLES: Still wines should be exhibited in clear (not frosted) white (not tinted) glass punted (recessed bottom) wine bottles of approximately 26 fluid ounces capacity. Bottles should have rounded shoulders and not the long, sloping shoulders as found containing most reising or rhine wines. The white glass French sauterne-type bottle with a shallow punt is satisfactory.

CORKS: Natural cork stoppers should be used. They may be driven straight corks or flanged and hand applied. Flanged corks should be plain (not bearing a trade name or the like). All cork flanged stoppers available in wine supply stores are excellent. Corks may be
